

Worthington Christian High School Senior Awards

Worthington Christian High School annually bestows three scholarship awards to outstanding seniors. Each of the recipients receives a \$1000 scholarship, a personal plaque of recognition, and a nameplate on the school's award plaque.

The Daniel Award, named in honor of the Prophet Daniel who was unafraid to let his love for and devotion to God be known in a godless society. It is presented to the graduating senior who best exemplifies Daniel's bold faith and who has, "increased in wisdom and stature, and in favor with God and man." This award recognizes the godly development and testimony of the body, mind, and spirit of the student.

The Joshua Award is named in honor of the leader Joshua who, under the direction of God, led the Israelites victoriously against Godless nations. He was bold as a leader of God's people, and faithful as God's servant. This award is presented to the graduating senior who has most consistently displayed positive participation and leadership in Worthington Christian High School student activities and functions. The **Joshua Award** recognizes exemplary Christian leadership characterized by participation "heartily, as unto the Lord."

1. The recipients of both the **Daniel and Joshua Awards** are chosen by a vote of their classmates, all of whom will be asked to submit in writing their award nominations.
2. The information from seniors will be summarized by the Principal and presented to the faculty for their consideration.
3. The award recipients must be approved by a majority vote of the faculty.

The Solomon Award is named in honor of King Solomon who prayed for wisdom from God and, as a result, Scripture states: "And God gave Solomon wisdom and understanding exceeding much, and largeness of heart, even as the sand that is on the seashore. And Solomon's wisdom excelled the wisdom of all the children of the east country, and all the wisdom of Egypt."
(I Kings 4:29-30)

1. **The Solomon Award** is presented to the graduating senior who has been wisely diligent in academic endeavors.
2. This award recognizes that the student has studied to show himself, "approved unto God, a workman that needeth not to be ashamed."
3. This is evidenced by outstanding academic achievement from the beginning of the freshman year through the end of the senior year, placing the student in the top 10% of the class.
4. In addition, this should be a student who has taken courses that challenge his or her ability—not a student who has avoided the academic challenges in order to gain a higher GPA.
5. A list of candidates will be compiled including all students in the top 10% of the class.
6. Final selection is made by a majority vote of the high school faculty after careful consideration of the entire criterion.
